

Social or Performance Character



2) Restoring Multiple Sport Athletes



- Have to find ways of recognizing those that play multiple sports publicly
- Must embrace, educate, PREACH the message and stay the course

 Selfishness and ethnocentric battles make it all worth while


- Your Athletic Dept. as an entity not one offs
- Community as the biggest picture "everyone a Viking" etc.




