Alaska v. Oregon



Alaska Is Big!

- You could fit Oregon into Alaska 7 times! One-fifth the size of the Lower 48, Alaska is bigger than Texas,
 California, and Montana combined!
- Alaska is also far-flung: 6.2 times wider (east to west) and 4.6 times taller (north to south) than Oregon. From
 north to south, Alaska measures 1420 miles, the distance from Denver to Mexico City, and east to west 2500
 miles, the distance from Savannah, GA to Santa Barbara, CA. See detailed Alaska maps.
- Alaska also has the most northern point (Point Barrow) and the most western point (Cape Wrangell, Alaska -further west than Hawaii) in the U.S.

Population Density

- Oregon has 37 times more people per square mile.
- If Oregon's population density were the same as Alaska's, only 97,246 people would live in Oregon rather than 3,559,596 (based on 2003 data).





4 Class Athletics/ Activities Waiver Resolution #10a Nora Saltonstall/ L. Glenn Kodiak High School

Be it resolved by the general assembly of the Alaska Association of Student Governments:

- 1. Whereas, currently according to the Alaska School Activities Association (ASAA), a student in public schools in Alaska must be enrolled in a minimum of four (4) classes to be eligible to participate in ASAA sanctioned athletics and activities³;
- 2. Whereas, ASAA governs all athletics and activities for public schools in Alaska;
- 3. Whereas, many of the large school districts in Alaska have a 6-period day¹;
- **4. Whereas**, an increasing number of students split their day in half (approximately 3 classes) to make time available to work due to meeting graduation requirements ahead of schedule:
- 5. Whereas, the students in our schools today have unique needs compared to students of the past. Requiring four classes does not recognize that education has changed for our 21st century learners, there are a variety of ways to gain a quality education outside of a traditional classroom experience;
- 6. Whereas, due to many factors, (unemployment/ underemployment, inflation, post pandemic fallout, multigenerational families, exorbitant cost of continual education, etc.), many students are being compelled to work to support themselves and/or contribute to their families' finances:
- **7. Whereas**, students who are enrolled in less than four classes currently do not have the opportunity to participate in athletics and activities³;
- **8.** Whereas, students typically are employed throughout the school year, not solely during a sports season, (with an approximate three-month duration), therefore temporary or part time work is not optimal;

- 9. Whereas, activities and athletics are an important part of the educational experience and provide many benefits to youth such as boosted self-esteem, increased mental health, better academic performance, and increased problem-solving skills²;
- **10. Whereas**, a student who does not meet the current four class requirement would be able to petition ASAA through their local athletic director/ administration for a waiver;
- 11. Whereas, local athletic directors/ administrators have the best chance to know students and their individual situations and would serve to screen out students who may take advantage of the waiver;
- **12. Whereas,** students must participate in a minimum of three classes to participate in ASAA activities;

Therefore, be it resolved by the Alaska Association of Student Governments and the General Assembly of AASG that students who are enrolled in less than four classes be able to petition their athletic director/ site administrator to submit a waiver to ASAA to participate in ASAA sanctioned activities and athletics.

Action Statement: This resolution, if approved by the General Assembly of AASG, will be sent to Billy Strickland ASAA President and ASAA Board of Directors.

Be it Resolved by the Alaska Association of Student Governments that:

Be it resolved by the Alaska Association of Student Governments;

- 1. Whereas, there are no spring sports at Craig High School:
- 2. Whereas, students would like more opportunities to participate in sports;
- 3. Whereas, there are two adults willing to coach a track team;
- 4. Whereas, a track team would not require large numbers of students to participate;
- 5. Whereas, startup costs would be minimal;
- 6. Whereas, any student who is eligible could participate;
- 7. Whereas, there is no equipment that would need to be purchased for track alone. Events that do not use specialized equipment would be the ones participated in;
- 8. Whereas, it would allow students to keep in shape;
- 9. Whereas, participation sports benefits grades, attitudes, enrollment, and reduces drug and alcohol use¹²;
- 10. Whereas, a track team at Craig High School has the support of the Craig High School Athletic Director;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Alaska Association of Student Governments supports the creation of a track team at Craig High School.

ARTICLE 1 - BOARD OF DIRECTORS, ORGANIZATION & OPERATION DEFINITION

Section 1 - Organization and Terms of Members

A. The administration of the Association is vested in the Board of Directors composed of representatives elected by the member schools of each regional association and one representative each from the Alaska Association of School Boards and the Alaska Association of School Administrators. Each selected member of the Board of Directors shall have one vote. The Alaska Association of Student Governments (1978) is invited to appoint one non-voting ex-officio representative to the Board with terms not to exceed two years. Requests for additional ex-officio membership on the Board of Directors must be approved by the Board and member schools.

Two-year term

- The ASAA Board typically meets four times a year.
 - Early October
 - Early December
 - Mid-February
 - Late April/Early May



We ask AASG to select a sophomore. Board member terms end in December, so the incoming AASG Representative serves the spring semester of their 10th grade year, all their junior year and the first semester of their senior year.

Methods to most effectively using an exofficio student representative

#1...make sure they are part of the group:

They sit at the table as the other Board members.

They get the same "perks" as the other Board members. (gear, out to dinner, hand out awards, etc.)

They call me "Billy" not "Mr. Strickland"...some struggle with this one.



#2...They vote first on motions...this allows the other Board members to get the student's advice.



➤ <u>3A/4A Basketball Seeding:</u> motion and second "to seed the 3A and 4A basketball tournaments solely using the results of the RPI."

#3...give them Board member trainings...with the other incoming Board members

PROPOSAL TO ADD ARTICLE 9.11. – STUDENT ADVISORY COUNCIL

- QUESTION: Should the Delegate Assembly approve adding a Student Advisory Council to the OSAA standing committees?
- **RATIONALE:** The purpose is to enhance the total student-participant experience by promoting leadership opportunities, protecting student-participant well-being, and offering input on the rules, regulations, and policies that affect students in member schools. This council will also give the opportunity for a student-participant voice within the OSAA structure, allow students to actively participate in the administrative process, and provide a positive student-participant image.



CHARGE

- 9.11. Student Advisory Council.
 - 9.11.1. Charge. The Council shall serve in an advisory capacity focusing on ways to engage and meet the needs of students while also applying an equity lens in all aspects of the Association's work. The purpose is to enhance the total student-participant experience by promoting opportunity, protecting student-participant well-being, and offering input on the rules, regulations, and policies that affect students in member schools. The SAC shall also seek input from all grade levels, classifications, geographic regions, and underrepresented populations of students across Oregon.





COMPOSITION

- 9.11. Student Advisory Council.
 - 9.11.2. Composition. The Council shall have 10 members and shall consist of one representative from each classification, one 6A/5A/4A at-large representative, one 3A/2A/1A at-large representative, a representative of the Oregon Association of Student Councils, and one adult member. Other criteria to be considered when selecting members may include, but not limited to, geographic, gender, and ethnic representation. The adult member shall be from a member school who serves in a student advisory role in their district.





TERMS AND MEETINGS

- 9.11. Student Advisory Council.
 - 9.11.3. Term. Members shall serve a two-year non-renewable term.
 - 9.11.4. Meetings. The Council shall adopt an annual schedule of meetings based upon the issues under consideration. The schedule shall include an appropriate number of meetings in which to conduct the business of the Council.
