

Purpose of Classification and Process

- Increase the opportunity for all schools to participate safely and effectively in postseason competition.
- Provide competitive equity
- Regularly review the placement of teams.
- Reduce the loss of programs in schools.



Definitions

- MSHSL Enrollment Total students 9 12 minus 40% of students receiving educational benefits (free and reduced)
- Classification Assigning teams to classes of competition by enrollment. Computed sport by sport.
- MDE Minnesota Department of Education. MDE computes average daily membership for schools.
- Opt Up Schools choose to compete at a higher class than computed.
- Appeal (Down) Request to compete at a lower class than computed.



Definitions

- <u>Class</u> The group of schools, in an activity, across the state that compete in the postseason at the same level for the chance to go to state tournament.
- <u>Section</u> The regional group of teams that compete against one another to advance to the state tournament.
- Cooperative Agreement Two or more MSHSL members schools choose to combine in a specific sport.
- Co-op enrollment 100% of largest school's MSHSL Enrollment and 50% of remaining schools.



Important Concepts

- 1. Classification and Competitive Section Placement is done every two years
- 2. Classification is done by Activity (not by school)
 - May be different for boys and girls in the same sport
- 3. Team vs Individual Sports:
 - Team Sports may appeal their classification (not their section)
 - Individual Sports may opt up, but are not permitted to appeal



The Classification Process

- 1. Raw Enrollments are determined.
 - Oct. 1, public schools report to Dept of Ed (MDE)
 - Dec. 1, non-public schools may complete a Nonpublic report Form with MDE (includes free/reduced student count)
- 2. Schools complete any co-op agreements and schools/teams determine if they will "opt up" (End of January)
- 3. MSHSL Enrollments are calculated and assigned. (early Feb.)
 - Use MDE raw enrollments and free/reduced student count to determine the MSHSL Enrollment for every team. (subtract 40% F/R)



The Classification Process (pg. 2)

- 3. Rank order lists of teams are created in every sport based on MSHSL Enrollment (Late Feb.)
- 4. The "cut lines" are established using the determined number of classifications and the method of classification in each sport/fine arts program. (Late Feb.)
 - "Opt ups" are moved up to the class they have selected.
 - The number of teams, starting with the opt ups, are counted and lines are drawn.

The Classification Process (pg. 3)

- 5. Schools are given the option to appeal in team sports only if they meet criteria. (Early March)
 - Must meet criteria for an appeal
 - Must complete the questionnaire required for rubric scoring
- 6. All information supplied is presented by the appealing school and reviewed and scored by our ADs Advisory Committee.
- 7. ADs Advisory Committee recommends granting of appeals to Board of Directors Executive Committee for approval. (Early April)



Appeals

A school or co-op must meet one of these two qualifications to appeal to a lower classification:

Co-op or school enrollment must exceed 50% free/reduced lunch,

and/or


 MSHSL enrollment must be within 10% of the enrollment cut-off for that sport or activity




Rubric Scoring

- Enrollment trend
- Proximity of enrollment to the classification cut-off
- Free and Reduced lunch percentage
- Percentage of Free and Reduced that participate in that sport
- SLIFE % and % of SLIFE that participate by sport
- Regular season and postseason records the past five years

- Participation numbers in the sport, total for grades 9 -12 for each of past five years
- Religious and/or cultural factors that impact participation
- Mobility of students/transient population
- Economic factors in your school's community
- Additional information unique to your school community




Boys Basketball - Class A






Criteria for Competitive Section Placement shall include, but will not be limited to the following:

- Geographic/contiguity
 - No school inside of the boundaries of a section may be placed in a different section.
- Section balance
 - The number of total schools in every section must be:
 - Within two for classes of our "big" schools.
 - Within four for classes of our "small" schools.

The Differential in Number of Assigned Teams in Competitive Sections at the time of placement shall be as follows:

Two classes:

- Class AA: Unless otherwise determined by the Board of Directors, in the initial year of the twoyear assignment, the differential shall not exceed two (2) teams in each competitive section.
- Class A: Unless otherwise determined by the Board of Directors, in the initial year of the twoyear assignment, the differential shall not exceed four (4) teams in each competitive section.

Multiple Class (three or more):

• Unless otherwise determined by the Board of Directors, in the initial year of the two-year assignment, the differential shall not exceed two (2) team for any class.
